# You're standing beside women leaders in climate emergencies

In Kenya, women like Abigail are no strangers to drought caused by climate change.

Without rain the crops are burnt to a crisp by the sun, and life becomes almost unbearable.

By joining an ActionAid Village Savings and Loan Association, Abigail (pictured below) has learnt cutting-edge climate-resilient farming methods. Thanks to supporters like you, she now has a thriving kitchen garden and is so proud of what she has built for herself and her family in the face of an unprecedented climate disaster.

In Vanuatu, women are exposed to increasingly frequent cyclones and emergencies caused by climate change. To make things worse, they are often left out of decision making and are excluded in times of crisis.

But things are changing. Your generous support has enabled women in Vanuatu to build resilience to climate change through the powerful network called 'Women Talk Together'. This women's network empowers women to adapt to the impacts of climate change, share information, build their collective power and independence.

It's been two years since Russian forces invaded Ukraine. Life changed forever for millions of women as they were forced to flee their homes. Today, as the war shows no signs of ending, women and girls who have been displaced by the conflict still need our help to uphold their leadership, dignity and rights.

It's been a year since destructive earthquakes struck Syria and Türkiye, destroying homes and lives - killing over 50,000 people.

The communities affected have shown so much resilience in the face of this devastation, with women and young people leading the rebuilding efforts.

Thanks to supporters like you, who were quick to respond to this emergency and the incredible work of our friends at the Emergency Action Alliance, we provided humanitarian aid to over 197,211 people.

After over 12 years of conflict, Syria remains one of the world's largest humanitarian crises.

The earthquakes further compounded an already dire crisis. Escalating the urgent need for shelter for displaced people, medical care, food, clean water and sanitation, and protection for women and girls exposed to gender-based violence.

Jumana II, has been given mental health support, comfort and advice around staying safe in the aftermath of the earthquake. Since the earthquake, Jumana has been unable to attend school. One day, Jumana wishes to become a doctor to help the children who were trapped under the rubble caused by the earthquake.



## Your generous gift helped our local partners:



Mobilise youth volunteers to pull survivors from the rubble, reaching 6,330 people.



**Provide urgent medical** care to more than 27,933 displaced people.



**Distribute clean water, hygiene kits** and build washing facilities to over 37,667 people.



Ensure women and girls had access to private washing facilities in 15 temporary camps, to reduce their risk of harassment or assault.



Set-up Mobile Mental Health units which were a lifeline to hundreds of traumatised children living in remote areas.



Offer counselling and legal aid to survivors of gender-based violence.

## Thank you from the women of Vanuatu

My name is Flora Vano. I'm a Ni-Vanuatu woman, climate activist and Country Manager at ActionAid

Vanuatu. I spend my days working to build the power of women in Vanuatu, who are bearing the brunt of climate breakdown.

Vanuatu experienced three cyclones last year, which damaged our crops and displaced a lot of families. Our homes, food sources, safety and traditional ways of life are in the firing line.

There can be no more investment in new fossil fuels if our communities are to have a future. To stay below 1.5 degrees, we need a phase out not a phase down of fossil fuels. It is not just a goal of the Paris Agreement but a lifeline for our Pacific Island nations.

When I travelled from Vanuatu to Dubai at the end of last year to attend the UN Climate Conference, I took with me thousands of signatures from ActionAid Australia supporters alongside the voices of our network of women here in the Pacific. You demanded climate justice both for Vanuatu and for women like us across the world whose lives are also at risk.

And we did it! Because of your support, and the hard work of so many people around the region, we were successful in pushing Australia to pledge an end to fossil fuel expansion.

By working together to increase climate ambition, action, and solidarity we will create a safer world for everyone. Thank you so much.



### Vanuatu Climate Minister in Sydney

On his way to COP28, ActionAid Australia hosted the Honourable Ralph Regenvanu, Vanuatu's Minister for Climate Change to deliver a keynote on Climate Leadership and the Pacific at an event in Sydney.

The event was co-hosted by ActionAid and Groundswell and supported by The Art Gallery of NSW, Philanthropy Australia and NEXUS as momentum starts to build towards Australia hosting COP31.

"We need to see much more commitment to taking money away from the fossil fuel sector and putting it into adaptation. We are not seeing enough courage from governments in the fossil fuel producing countries," said Minister Regenvanu.

Flora Vano, Country Manager of ActionAid Vanuatu, also joined Tishiko King, Campaigner of Our Islands Our Home and ActionAid Australia Executive Director Michelle Higelin on a panel for the event. They called upon Australians to say no to the expansion of fossil fuels and yes to supporting women in frontline communities to address the impacts of climate breakdown.





# Your voice heard at COP28

ActionAid supporters helped bring about two important wins at the United Nations climate conference, COP28:

People around the country joined Flora Vano from Vanuatu in calling for wealthy countries to end their support for fossil fuel expansion, the leading cause of global warming. Pressure from thousands of passionate people like you saw Australia sign the Glasgow Statement – a global commitment to stop public funding of fossil fuel projects overseas and increase support for clean energy.

## Your impact around the world

You enabled women globally to lead their communities through emergencies, build their economic independence and come together to support each other.



#### **THE PHILIPPINES**

This year, we supported the second Womentarian Summit, bringing 84 women around the country and government together to discuss how to support and empower women leaders in times of disaster.



#### **AFGHANISTAN**

Thank you to those who supported our Afghanistan appeal. This is one of the most challenging contexts globally for women and girls, who are also facing a humanitarian crisis with one third of the population currently facing hunger.



#### **INDONESIA**

Women were empowered to act as focal points in their village for disaster preparedness, gender-based violence case management and livelihood activities.

## Dignity for women in Gaza

### Your support continues to help women affected by the devastating crisis in Gaza.

ActionAid supporters like you have already donated over \$60,000 to help the thousands of people displaced in the conflict, and working with partners, over 70,000 Australians have signed our petition calling on Foreign Minister Penny Wong to support an immediate ceasefire.

The situation in Gaza remains dire, with women and children making up 70% of those killed. Food, water, fuel, and electricity are rapidly running out. The entire population is facing crisis due to the lack of food and water. Women are giving birth in unsterile conditions and without pain relief. Newborn babies cannot access medical care and without clean water, their mothers cannot produce enough milk to feed them.

Displaced women in Gaza are so desperate they are using pieces of the tents they rely on for shelter from the cold and rain as a substitute for period products. Women are showing incredible resilience and finding ways to manage their needs as best they can, but they shouldn't have to: it is a fundamental right for women to be able to manage their periods safely and with dignity.

Our partners in Gaza are supporting women and girls amid extremely challenging and dangerous conditions with your support.

#### You have:



**Helped reach over 80,000 people** with humanitarian relief in Gaza.



**Provided 15,590 people** with urgent food.



**Distributed 13,700 hygiene kits** in January - which include tissues, toilet paper, soap, sanitary pads and wet wipes.



Constructed 60 toilets and shower blocks in Rafah to provide women and girls with a safe private space to attend to their hygiene needs.



**Provided 500 blankets** for displaced families along with additional clothing.
